Easter Clues

Materials

- □ White board and markers or paper and pencil
- □ Eraser

□ Clue Words (see list below)

Instructions

Note: this game is a variation of Hangman except students will draw a cross instead of a hangman. Choose one student to be the drawer and tell him a clue word(s) from the list below.

Have the drawer mark blanks (short lines) on the board/paper for each letter in the clue word(s) then write out the alphabet below the blanks. Other students will take turns guessing a letter. If the letter is in the word(s), the drawer writes the letter on all the blanks it appears then crosses out that letter in the alphabet. If the letter isn't in the word, the drawer adds a section to the cross (hill, bottom left side of cross, bottom right side, left crossbeam, right crossbeam, top) and crosses out that letter in the alphabet.



The students will continue guessing letters until they can either guess the word(s) or until the drawer completes all six sections of the cross drawing. The drawer wins if the cross is completed; the students win if they guess the word(s).

Continue as time allows, using other clue words and choosing different students to be the drawer. You may also allow students to think of their own words/phrases related to Easter.

Suggested Discussion

Some of these words sounded familiar, didn't they? We talked about how Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey and the people welcomed him as a king, but then he was crucified. Today we'll learn what happened after Jesus died. Listen carefully to the lesson and see how many of these other words you recognize.

Now You See It

Materials

- \Box White board
- □ Marker and eraser for white board

Instructions

Write the memory verse on the board. Recite the verse together. Choose a student to come up to the board and erase one or two words at a time. Have the class recite the entire verse each time another word is erased. Continue erasing words and reciting until all of the words are gone. Then ask students to try reciting the whole verse without any words left on the board.

Review Card Relay

Materials

- □ Index cards
- □ Tape or poster putty
- □ Memory Verse Poster

Instructions

Write one or two words from the memory verse on each index card. Make one set for each team. Divide the class into teams. Randomly lay out each set of cards facedown on the floor—one set for each team. Put a piece of poster putty or tape on each one. Place the Memory Verse Poster where students can see it.

Have teams line up away from the cards. When the relay begins, the first student in each line will race to the cards, pick one up, and put it on the wall or board. As the relay continues, students will put each card on the board in the proper order. They may need to rearrange the cards to fit others.

When finished, have the class read the verse aloud together.

Edible Empty Tomb

Materials

One of the following for each student:

- □ Small paper/plastic plates
- □ Graham cracker squares
- □ Mini chocolate donuts
- □ Mini round cookies
- □ Toothpicks
- □ Risen Labels (following page)

Enough to share:

- □ Vanilla frosting
- $\hfill\square$ Green food coloring
- □ Plastic knives
- 🗆 Таре
- □ Optional: cookie crumbles, sprinkles, decorative candies

Instructions

Before class: Print and cut out one Risen Label for each student. Prepare bowls of frosting (stir in green food coloring) and supply knives at each table. Cut off one edge of each donut just under the hole. Break graham crackers into squares.

During class: Pass out one plate and one graham cracker square to each student. Have students form a small circle of frosting in the center of their plate and gently press their cracker onto the frosting to hold it still. Then have students frost the top of the graham cracker.

Pass out one pre-cut donut and one cookie to each student. Have students press their donut, hole side down, onto the top of the frosted graham cracker to form the empty tomb. Then place one cookie next to the hole in the donut to represent the stone rolled away from the entrance. If desired, use cookie crumbles, sprinkles, or other candies to decorate the frosting around the tomb.

Have students color one Risen Label and tape it onto one end of a toothpick. Poke the opposite end into the donut as a flag.

Suggested Discussion

When the women came to the tomb where Jesus was laid, an angel had rolled away the stone that was in front of the entrance so they could see it was empty. The angel told them Jesus had risen just as he said. The women were so happy! They ran to tell the disciples the good news. We should be excited to share the good news of the resurrection with others, too!

Resurrection Race

Materials

- □ White board or paper
- □ Markers or pencils
- □ Eraser
- □ Masking tape

Instructions

Divide students into two teams (or more, based on class size). Divide the board into sections or supply paper attached to the wall or on a table for each team. Have markers or pencils available. NOTE: if you use paper, make sure markers won't soak through to the wall or table.

Write the phrase "Jesus is risen" on the board or on paper for reference. Use tape to mark a start line across the room from the board/paper and have teams line up. Explain that teams will be racing to complete the phrase "Jesus is risen," writing one letter at a time.

When you say "Go!" the first students will race to the board/paper, write the letter J, leave the marker there, run back to their line, and tag the next person. The next students will run to write the letter E and so on until teams complete the phrase. The first team to complete the phrase and return to their line wins.

You may repeat the race, giving the students a new phrase to complete (e.g., Jesus rose from the grave, Jesus is alive, The tomb is empty, or Happy Resurrection Day) or having students run backwards, hop, or complete another action to get across the room and back.

Suggested Discussion

A lot of running happened in our lesson today. The women raced to tell the disciples that Jesus appeared to them. Peter and John raced to the empty tomb. And the two followers Jesus spoke to on the road hurried back to Jerusalem to tell others they'd seen Jesus.

Jesus' followers were excited to hear the good news that Christ had risen. Jesus conquered death so we can have forgiveness and eternal life. We should be excited to share this message with our friends and family, too.
